All members of the SFU community (faculty, staff and students) are responsible for compliance with the *Copyright Act of Canada* and for respecting the intellectual property rights of others.

FAIR DEALING

Anyone may make a copy of part of a copyrighted work for the purposes of research, private study, education, parody, satire, criticism or review, or news reporting, provided that the amount of copying is fair.

SFU employees and students may reproduce and communicate, in paper or electronic form, short excerpts. A short excerpt being up to 10% of a copyrighted work, or the following, whichever is greater:

- One chapter from a book,
- A single article from a periodical,
- An entire artistic work (including a painting, print, photograph, diagram, drawing, map, chart, and plan) from a copyright protected work containing other artistic works,
- An entire newspaper article or page,
- An entire single poem or musical score from a copyright protected work containing other poems or musical scores,
- An entire entry from an encyclopedia, annotated bibliography, dictionary or similar reference work.

DISPLAY FOR INSTRUCTION OR EXAMINATIONS

SFU faculty and staff may reproduce a work to display on the university premises for purposes of instruction or as required for a test or examination provided the work is not readily commercially available in the desired format.
